Dear readers, donors, partners, supporters and colleagues, the year 2025 was a year that once again tested our resilience and perseverance. During the Jubilee Year in the Catholic Church, which carried the message of being "pilgrims of hope," it became clear that hope is not an abstract concept, but a daily decision to help where needed.

The Three Kings Collection remained a strong symbol of solidarity while celebrating its 25th anniversary. A quarter-century of carolling also means a quarter-century of small financial donations, which can provide for caregiving services, counselling centres, home healthcare and hospice care, support for low-income families, and rapid assistance during emergencies.

We also kept supporting people affected by the war in Ukraine – people who had to

leave their homes as well as those who stayed in the affected regions. Our aid was also directed to civilians in the Gaza Strip where families found themselves in danger and without necessities. In humanitarian work, it remains essential to see the real human stories behind the numbers.

The year 2025 was also a year of gradual recovery from the devastating floods. For many people, it was not a one-off event, their return to normal life took several months – they had to rebuild their homes as well as cope with emotional stress and uncertainty. This is precisely where the importance of combining immediate assistance with long-term support becomes clear.

At the same time, poverty continued to deepen in 2025. The number of households facing financial difficulties was on

the rise, pressure on social and health services was increasing, and even people who had not previously needed assistance began to seek it out. This makes the role of Caritas even more important: to be there where help is needed; with a professional yet compassionate approach and the ability to respond both in the short term and the long term.

I would like to express my gratitude to everyone who supported Caritas in 2025 – our employees, volunteers, donors, and partners. Your work, solidarity and prayers create a solid foundation of our assistance to specific people.

WHO WE ARE

Caritas Czech Republic is the oldest charitable organisation and the largest non-state social and healthcare services provider in the Czech Republic. We have been helping people in need for more than a century, and we developed a fully professional nationwide network after 1989.

We help seniors, people with disabilities, the terminally ill, the homeless, victims of violence, families in crisis, and foreigners living in the Czech Republic. We provide **social and healthcare services**, professional counselling and material help. At the same time, we respond to **emergencies** and provide **humanitarian and development aid abroad**. Our work also includes **advocacy** and support for systemic changes aimed at creating a more just and inclusive society.

CARITAS NETWORK

Caritas Czech Republic consists of a wide network of **archdiocesan, diocesan, regional, municipal and parish organisations**, including **the Czech Catholic Caritas and the Greek Catholic Caritas**. Individual Caritas organisations are autonomous legal entities, united by a shared mission, values, and standards.

INTERNATIONAL COLLABORATION

We are part of the global Caritas Internationalis network, which brings together 162 independent national organisations in more than 200 countries, and the European network – Caritas Europa, which has 49 members. This allows us to contribute to addressing humanitarian crises and development challenges around the world, while bringing international experience to the Czech Republic.

SIGNIFICANT EVENTS AND PROJECTS

OF CARITAS CZECH REPUBLIC IN 2025

For Caritas Czech Republic, 2025 was once again a year marked by intense work, public engagement, and reaffirmation of the values that underpin our mission. Throughout the year, Caritas Czech Republic responded to current social challenges, continued its long-term projects, and raised important issues in the areas of social and health policy, solidarity, and international aid.





Traditionally, the year began with the **JUBILEE THREE KINGS CONCERT** at the Brno City Theatre, which was broadcast live by Czech Television. Thanks to the extraordinary support of the public, we were able to raise a record CZK 2.7 million to help people in need. At the same time, Caritas Czech Republic celebrated the 25th anniversary of the Three Kings Collection – the largest volunteer collection in the Czech Republic (for more information, see p. 20). The anniversary was an opportunity to look back on 25 years of solidarity, in which tens of thousands of carollers, volunteers, and donors participate every year.

In February, Caritas Czech Republic published the **CARITAS CARES 2024** report, which focuses on issues related to the social support system in the Czech Republic. The report was presented to the professional community at a press conference held at the Marianum Hotel. The document highlighted the weaknesses of the current system and drew attention to the potential risks of the planned changes.



A JOINT PRESS CONFERENCE HELD BY NON-GOVERNMENTAL ORGANISATIONS on February 19, 2025, to mark THE THIRD ANNIVERSARY OF AID TO UKRAINE

provided a comprehensive overview of the activities of Czech humanitarian organisations. It focused both on aid provided directly in Ukraine and on support for people who fled the war to the Czech Republic. In addition to Caritas Czech Republic, the conference was also attended by People in Need, ADRA, Koridor UA, Consortium of Migrants Assisting Organisations, Doctors Without Borders, Post Bellum / Memory of Nations, and other actors in the humanitarian and migration aid sectors.



The **LENTEN ALMS COLLECTION** began in February. It is a traditional voluntary collection associated with the Lenten season, which encourages self-reflection and specific assistance for people facing difficult life circumstances.

In connection with the **JUBILEE YEAR 2025** proclaimed by Pope Francis, Caritas highlighted the topic of hope in times of global crisis and emphasised the importance of solidarity and social cohesion.

For the fifth time, the nationwide campaign **DARÁNEK HELPS CHILDREN** (Daránek pomáhá dětem) was held accompanied by a collection – the proceeds of which primarily benefit the youngest and most vulnerable – namely, children from poor and at-risk families – those who face a more difficult start in their lives than others.



Together with Platforma 10, Caritas repeatedly drew attention to the **UNEQUAL PAY IN THE SOCIAL SERVICES**

SECTOR, which has been putting a burden on workers in the helping professions and threatening the stability of services. Caritas Czech Republic, together with other social service providers, is calling for fairer funding and has joined the **EQUAL PAY CAMPAIGN** (Stejná odměna), which aims to eliminate pay inequalities among social service employees.

Caritas Czech Republic participated nationwide in the **2025 FOOD COLLECTION**, which made it possible to replenish food aid for individuals and families at risk of poverty and social exclusion.

To mark the **80TH ANNIVERSARY OF THE END OF WORLD WAR II**, Caritas highlighted its historic role as an organisation that has stood by those in need, both in the past and today.





The **YOUNG CARITAS FORUM** took place in June. The event, for the third time, provided a space for young people to meet, share their experience, and actively participate in Caritas activities (for more information, see p. 52).

Caritas was, as usual, present at the **DAYS OF GOODWILL IN VELEHRAD**, where it presented its work to the public, shared stories of aid, and provided visitors with an opportunity for personal interaction and conversation.

advocacy work in the social sector, addressed key issues such as the accessibility and quality of social and health services, dignified care for the elderly, support for families, the development of home care, and solutions to poverty and social exclusion. The discussion was moderated by **Bára Divišová**, a journalist, reporter, and TV NOVA anchor, and was attended by **six representatives of these political parties**: KDU ČSL/Spolu, ANO, Stačilo!, SPD, Piráti, and STAN.

The public was invited to participate in the memorial procession and the **LIGHT FOR LOST CHILDHOOD** charity concert, which expressed solidarity with the child victims of the conflict in Palestine and Israel and was co-organised by Caritas.

ONE YEAR AFTER THE DEVASTATING FLOODS that struck several regions of the Czech Republic in 2024, **a joint press conference was held by the humanitarian organisations** that helped the affected communities and households (ADRA, People in Need, Czech Red Cross, Diaconia of the ECCB, and Caritas Czech Republic). Representatives of the organisations provided an overview of the humanitarian aid provided to the date, emphasised the importance of coordinated cooperation in the affected regions, and drew attention to the ongoing needs of people who are still coping with the aftermath of the disaster, even a year later. Their statement also emphasised the need for long-term support in areas where the effects of floods impact housing, financial stability, and the overall quality of life of local residents.

The **DAY OF CHARITY** was celebrated in September commemorating the legacy of St. Vincent de Paul and



the values upon which charity service is based. Caritas organisations across the Czech Republic organised a diverse programme for the public to mark the occasion – including masses, concerts, exhibitions, and open houses – offering the chance to learn more about the world of Caritas, its services, and the people who shape them every day.

Caritas Czech Republic, together with the Archdiocesan Caritas Olomouc, **PROVIDED AID TO FLOOD VICTIMS IN HAITI**, specifically in the Baie de Henne region.

Senator Pavel Fischer opened the exhibition **GAZA BEYOND THE HEADLINES** (Gaza skrytá za palcovými titulky), which used documentary photographs to give the public a glimpse into the daily lives of people in the Gaza Strip and the work of medical staff at a clinic that Caritas Czech Republic supported on a long-term basis. The exhibition was linked to the Gaza Health Emergency Project II, a humanitarian initiative that provided basic healthcare, psychosocial support, and social counselling to civilians affected by the long-standing conflict (for more information, see p. 43).

In October, the final report prepared as part of the **UKRAINE REFUGEE RESPONSE LEARNING PLATFORM (URRLP)** was presented in Brussels; it summarises the key findings and recommendations from **more than three**



years of assistance to refugees from Ukraine. The document was produced in collaboration with Caritas organisations from Central and Eastern Europe under the leadership of Caritas Poland, with Caritas Czech Republic being a part of the platform since its foundation.

GO VIRAL! took place. **IDEATHON** that engaged young people in finding creative solutions to counter the negative effects of social media (for more information, see p. 53).



Caritas participated in the presentation of the **POVERTY WATCH 2025** report, which analysed the state of poverty and offered specific recommendations for public policy.

After nearly twenty years, Caritas Czech Republic **CONCLUDED ITS OPERATIONS IN MONGOLIA** and handed over the project documentation to the National Archives of Mongolia. The partnership, which began in 2006, included 21 humanitarian and development projects.

In November, our **REPORT ON OBSTACLES TO DEBT RELIEF** was released at a press conference; it was compiled by Caritas Czech Republic based on a survey conducted among the staff at our counselling centres.



In 2025, Caritas launched an **ONLINE ADVENT CALENDAR** that, throughout December, shared the wishes of specific people who receive support from Caritas, giving the public a glimpse into their daily lives.

The organisation joined the international **GIVING TUESDAY** initiative, which promotes generosity and solidarity.

The end of the year also brought a significant award: **Mgr. Jitka Richterová** received the Minister of Health Award for the Development of Health and Social Care in the Spanish Hall of Prague Castle.



CARITAS CZECH REPUBLIC MEETS THE CI MANAGEMENT STANDARDS

In 2025, **Caritas Czech Republic** successfully completed the international **CI Management Standards** assessment and was granted “compliant” status, confirming that it meets all the requirements. The assessment is carried out by **Caritas Internationalis** and takes place in regular four-year cycles.

The CI Management Standards are a set of rules and recommendations designed to help member organisations operate in a professional, transparent and sustainable manner. They focus on five key areas, including ethics and legal compliance, organisational and financial management, stakeholder involvement, and the safeguarding of children and vulnerable adults. Each area is broken down into specific requirements, which are assessed not only in terms of their formal implementation, but also in terms of how they work in everyday practice.

Successfully meeting the standards is not merely a box-ticking exercise. It also provides valuable feedback, helping the organisation to identify its strengths while highlighting areas where there is room for further improvement. For Caritas Czech Republic, confirmation of compliance with the standards is evidence of responsible governance and of its commitment to quality, openness and respect for the people it serves.

CHARITALK PODCAST

The well-established Caritas podcast **ChariTALK** continued successfully, entering its fourth year on air in 2025. It continued to provide its listeners with a platform for interviews with people dedicated to helping others, as well as discussions on social issues, health care, ethics, and current social topics. A total of **27 episodes** were released over the course of the year, including special episodes devoted to topics such as ethical dilemmas in health care and a debate on the future of social policy. The podcast is produced by the Communications Department of Caritas Czech Republic and, since late 2024, it has been recorded in the organisation's own studio at its headquarters in Prague. ChariTALK is also regularly featured in weekend programming of Radio Proglas, which helps to build a loyal audience and further promote the issues that Caritas has long been addressing.



CARITAS NURSE OF THE YEAR 2025

In May 2025, the **Caritas Nurse of the Year 2025 – Qualitas Optima Award** ceremony was held to honour nurses working in Caritas healthcare services. The award aims to highlight the importance of the professional, compassionate, and dedicated work of nurses who are there for people every day – whether they are sick, elderly, or in the last days of their lives.

The second annual awards ceremony took place on **May 15, 2025**, in the grand halls of the **Archbishop's Palace in Hradčany, Prague**. The award is presented by **Caritas Czech Republic** in collaboration with the professional association **Qualitas Optima 2020**, under the patronage of **Eva Pavlová**, wife of the President of the Czech Republic, and the **Czech Bishops' Conference**.

CARITAS CZECH REPUBLIC AWARD 2025



In October 2025, the **2025 Caritas Czech Republic Awards** were presented at a ceremony. These traditional awards recognise individuals and institutions whose long-term and dedicated efforts fulfil Caritas' mission – to help people in need and strengthen solidarity in society. The Caritas Award has been presented **annually since 2008** and serves as a symbol of gratitude for service that is often unassuming but essential to the lives of individuals and communities.

The ceremony took place on **October 17, 2025**, at **St. Vitus, Wenceslas, and Adalbert Cathedral at Prague Castle**. The awards were presented by **Bishop Pavel Posád**, president of Caritas Czech Republic, and **Lukáš Curylo**, director of Caritas Czech Republic. The ceremony was preceded by a Holy Mass in honour of St. Hedwig, celebrated by Prague Archbishop **Jan Graubner** together with Apostolic Nuncio **Jude Thaddeus Okolo** and the presidents of the diocesan Caritas organisations.

In 2025, a total of **14 winners** received awards in two categories: Outstanding Caritas Personality and Distinguished Caritas Supporter. The award is a **custom-made glass statuette** created by master glass-maker **David Wünsch**.

The aim of the project is to provide food and material aid for people from target groups (people in serious food or material need, e.g. homeless people, families in shelters, seniors, single parents, children and others). This aid is distributed in cooperation with the Ministry of Labour and Social Affairs through partner organisations, including Caritas Czech Republic and its participating entities – individual diocesan Caritas organisations. In addition to basic food, the assistance also includes hygiene essentials, school supplies, household equipment, clothing, tents and sleeping bags. The support also covers accompanying measures that contribute to a long-term solution of the difficult life situation of those receiving the aid.

Across all diocesan Caritas organisations, nearly **125,700 people were supported with food**, and **67,500 people were supported materially** in 2025. More than **153,400 people received counselling** to address their difficult social situation.

MILITARY SOLIDARITY FUND

In 2025, Caritas Czech Republic continued its close cooperation with the **Military Solidarity Fund (MSF)**, which was established in collaboration between Caritas Czech Republic and the Ministry of Defence of the Czech Republic in 2015. The cooperation continued to be governed by the **Agreement on Mutual Cooperation**, signed in November 2023, which expanded the group of individuals eligible to apply for support. This assistance is intended not only for active-duty soldiers, but also for professional soldiers



within five years of leaving the military service, war veterans, their family members, and their survivors.

Caritas Czech Republic managed the **MFS collection account** (no. 44665522/0800; with the variable symbol 918), maintained a database of donors, administered donation contracts and, in cooperation with the fund committee, provided financial assistance to those who found themselves in a difficult life situation.

In 2025, the fund received donations totalling CZK 13,719,392, of which CZK 7,016,069 allocated to direct aid for those in need. A total of 41,314 donors contributed to the Military Solidarity Fund, confirming public trust in the initiative and demonstrating solidarity with soldiers and their families.

SIGNIFICANT EVENTS AND PROJECTS

IN THE ARCHDIOCESES AND DIOCESES IN 2025

The year 2025 brought a number of events in individual archdioceses and dioceses that transcended the local context in their significance and had an influence on the perception of Caritas as a whole. In addition to the development of social and healthcare services, investments in infrastructure, and strategic changes in organisational leadership, the traditional Three Kings Collection was also one of the major events across the entire Caritas network (for more information, see p. 20). At the same time, Caritas has long been dedicated to helping people affected by the war in Ukraine and to showing solidarity on an international level (for more information, see p. 38).

DIOCESAN CARITAS BRNO

✳ The second **“PLANT A HELPING HAND”** (Zasad' pomoc) **COLLECTION** organised by DCHB expanded to cover nearly the entire diocese, with donors contributing more than CZK 160,000. ✳ The **“CAKE FOR THE HOSPICE”** (Koláč pro hospic) event also set a record, raising over CZK 4 million to support hospice, palliative, and home health care. ✳ In Rajhrad, the **ST. JOSEPH PAIN TREATMENT AND HOSPICE CENTRE** opened its doors to the public on several occasions, confirming that the issue of dignified end-of-life care enjoys strong support in the region. ✳ The **ZNOJMO HOME HOSPICE** celebrated its 10th anniversary, and the “Cake for the Hospice” event was marked by a festive atmosphere there as well. ✳ The **REGIONAL CARITAS TŘEBÍČ** saw significant growth in its services and began construction on the **ST. ZDISLAVA SERVICE CENTRE**. The new centre will bring together various types of home care and is the organisation's largest investment project in the last 30 years. ✳ In Blansko, the **DAY CENTRE NEW HOPE** (Nová naděje) expanded its assistance to homeless people to include field services, and the **NICE BLUE** (Pěkná modrá) **SOCIAL THERAPY WORKSHOP** celebrated its 25th anniversary. ✳ Projects focusing on children, families, volunteering, and solidarity in the community also deserved attention. A case management project for children from socially disadvantaged families was launched in **ZNOJMO**;



in **BŘECLAV**, the “Children for Children” (Děti dětem) project connected children from the **ST. AGATHA HOME** with elementary school students; and in **HODONÍN**, nearly 400 children participated in preventive programmes offered by the **LOW-THRESHOLD CLUB POHODA**. ✳ **DOBROCH** in Jihlava honoured 21 volunteers for their willingness to help others. ✳ In Tišnov, the charity bowling event raised a record CZK 104,500 for adjustable beds for home care. ✳ A Day of Generosity was held in **ŽDÁR NAD SÁZAVOU** to support the Caritas Rescue Network. In November, the concert called “Together for a Good Cause” (Společně pro dobrou věc) helped to fund the construction of a garden house for the users of the **NESA DAY CARE CENTRE IN VELKÉ MEZIRŘÍČÍ**.

DIOCESAN CARITAS ČESKÉ BUDĚJOVICE

✳ In 2025, the Diocesan Caritas of České Budějovice focused heavily on the **PREVENTION OF DOMESTIC AND GENDER-BASED VIOLENCE**. The organisation developed awareness-raising and educational initiatives focused, among other things, on elder abuse, which can remain hidden for a long time and requires sensitive cooperation among social services, healthcare professionals, local communities, and the public. Projects aimed at supporting foreigners with temporary protection were also an important part of the work. ✳ A significant milestone was the 20th anniversary of **ST. FRANCIS HOME IN VESELÍ NAD LUŽNICÍ** – sheltered housing facility for people with disabilities, limited self-sufficiency, or chronic mental illness. ✳ At the same time, the Diocesan Caritas launched a diocese-wide project called **“A GOOD DEED EVERY DAY”** (Dobrý skutek každý den) which invites the public to provide long-term, affordable support to people in need through small, regular donations.



✳ The expansion of services was evident throughout the South Bohemian Caritas network. **CARITAS ČESKÝ KRUMLOV** expanded its assistance to include the KOMPAS field programmes for people in marginalised communities. ✳ **CARITAS PÍSEK** began renovating the shelter for mothers with children in Veselíčko and operated a counselling centre for caregivers in the region of Písek. ✳ **CARITAS PRACHATICE-VIMPERK** completed an extensive renovation of the shelter for men in Záblatí, during which key parts of the building were restored and its capacity was increased. ✳ **CARITAS STRAKONICE** continued renovating the St. Anne's Retirement Home in Sousedovice and opened a training room for caregivers. ✳ **CARITAS SUŠICE** expanded its professional social counselling services to include informal caregivers and obtained accreditation for debt counselling. ✳ **CARITAS TŘEBOŇ** expanded its home care services, and **CARITAS PELHŘIMOV** established the company Dobromysl CHPE, which operates a charity shop and promotes the idea of helping others, which can also take the form of responsible shopping.

DIOCESAN CATHOLIC CARITAS HRADEC KRÁLOVÉ

✳ In the Diocese of Hradec Králové, the year 2025 was marked by a significant focus on expanding services for the elderly, the sick, families providing care, and people in need. The Diocesan Caritas Hradec Králové opened the **MOST COMMUNITY CENTRE**, which provides a space in the

regional capital for intergenerational gatherings, education, tutoring, and community activities. * Another significant step was the opening of the **SOCIAL SERVICES CENTRE IN HOLICE**, which provides the premises for the Červánky respite care service. * Support for people caring for their loved ones was growing throughout the diocese. Counselling services for caregivers are now offered by the **REGIONAL CARITAS PARDUBICE AND POLIČKA** as well as the **PARISH CARITAS LITOMYŠL**; in Polička, a counselling centre for people in need of palliative care was opened. * The **REGIONAL CARITAS HRADEC KRÁLOVÉ** co-organised a professional conference titled “The Patient’s Journey



through a Terminal Illness” (Cesta pacienta nevléčitelnou nemocí) and the **REGIONAL CARITAS ČERVENÝ KOSTELEČ** organised a conference on palliative care focused on integrating health and social services. * Hospice care was a major topic. The **ANEŽKA ČESKÁ HOSPICE IN ČERVENÝ KOSTELEČ**, the first hospice in the Czech Republic, celebrated 30 years of service and, on this occasion, awarded individuals who had contributed to the development of palliative care in the region and nationwide. A neurology clinic was opened at the **ST. PADRE PIO CENTRE**, and

a renovation of the elevator for patients with multiple sclerosis was completed at the **ST. JOSEPH HOME IN ŽIREČ**. * Significant investments were also made in social services infrastructure: in Kutná Hora, renovations began on a facility for early care and social activation services for families with children; in Havlíčkův Brod, projects focusing on shelter housing and preventive and social services continued; and in Rychnov nad Kněžnou, personal assistance services were added to the offer. * The Integration Centre for Foreigners organised the 12th annual **MEETING OF NATIONS FESTIVAL** (Setkání národů), which featured more than 20 countries from four continents, and participated in the Cultural Bridges event (Mosty kultury), which brought together Czech and Ukrainian traditions. The **ADOPTCE NA DÁLKU®** (Long-Distance Adoption) programme celebrated 25 years of aid in India with a visit from its Indian partners, benefit concerts, a new exhibition, and the documentary called Closeness from Afar (Blízkost na dálku).

DIOCESAN CARITAS LITOMĚŘICE

* The Diocesan Caritas Litoměřice also marked the start of 2025 by commemorating the third anniversary of the war in Ukraine. The memorial gathering was marked by respect, solidarity, and awareness that aid to the war-torn country – and to the people who found refuge in the Czech Republic – continues. An important internal step was strategic planning and the formation of a working group tasked with preparing home healthcare services for the quality and safety accreditation process. * The Diocesan Caritas has also established a partnership with Caritas Finland and, with the support of Caritas Czech Republic, replenished its emergency response supplies. * Significant investments were directed to residential and crisis services. The **RETIREMENT HOME**



IN SOBOTKA underwent extensive renovation, expansion, and modernisation. * **CARITAS ČESKÁ KAMENICE** completed the renovation of the St. Joseph’s Home, a home with special regime in Ústí nad Labem. * **CARITAS ÚSTÍ NAD LABEM** purchased and extensively renovated a shelter for women with children. * **CARITAS MOST** purchased a shelter from the town of Osek and launched a project to support foster families, aimed at helping children grow up in a safe and stable environment. A concession agreement was signed with the city of Litoměřice for a new shelter for men aged 18 and older, which is scheduled to open on January 1, 2026. * **CARITAS ČESKÁ LÍPA** celebrated its 25th anniversary while also preparing to launch a new service – Zdislava Crisis Assistance for families with children facing unexpected crises; starting in 2026, the service will offer residential, outpatient, and field support and will have two residential units with eight beds. In Česká Lípa, renovation

work also continued on the property on Dubická Street, which is set to become a community space linking social services with public life in the city. * **CARITAS ŠLUKNOV** joined efforts to transform the Šluknov housing estate in collaboration with the city and the Agency for Social Inclusion. * **CARITAS TEPLICE** concluded the Caritas Teplice Intercultural Centre project, which, from May 2024 to October 2025, primarily supported individuals arriving from Ukraine under temporary protection.

ARCHDIOCESAN CARITAS OLOMOUC

* In the archdiocese of Olomouc, the year 2025 was marked by ongoing efforts to assist those affected by the floods that had occurred in the previous year. The Archdiocesan Caritas Olomouc and local Caritas organisations continued to support households in the regions of Šumperk and Zábřeh long after the flood receded: they provided targeted financial and material assistance, helped with the restoration of homes, and connected local needs with donors and fundraising efforts. For this long-term assistance, the Archdiocesan Caritas Olomouc received an award from the Olomouc Region. * There was a significant change in the organisation's leadership: after thirty years of service at Caritas, the former director, **VÁCLAV KEPRT**, stepped down, and **ROBERT NEUGEBAUER** became the new director on July 1. * At the same time, the network strengthened its emergency preparedness, including through a meeting of local Caritas coordinators from the archdiocese of Olomouc. * In the area of home services, key developments included investments in facilities for people with health or social disadvantages. * **CARITAS OLOMOUC** completed the renovation of the St. Cosmas and Damian Home on Wurmova Street; the result is a modern, barrier-free facility that meets the current needs



of its residents as well as environmental standards. A new facility for people with mental illness opened in Řepčín, featuring consultation rooms, common areas, and a pottery workshop. Caritas Olomouc also focused on professional exchange in the field of mental health and organised a conference on trauma and psychosomatics. * The field of palliative and hospice care also saw significant growth. The **SVATÝ KOPEČEK HOSPICE** continued to organise events for the public and bereaved families, participated in Hospice Care Day in the Olomouc Region and hosted the 4th annual Run for the Hospice charity event. * As part of its international aid efforts, the Archdiocesan Caritas Olomouc celebrated 20 years of work in Haiti and continued to support healthcare in Baie de Henne. In Ukraine, it implemented the targeted food aid programme "Fill Your Plate" (Napln talíř) and, in collaboration with partners, delivered thirty adjustable hospital beds and bedside tables to Kolomyia.

DIOCESAN CARITAS OSTRAVA-OPAVA

* In the diocese of Ostrava-Opava, the Three Kings Collection was once again one of the most significant events of 2025, raising CZK 26.8 million. Solidarity was not limited to regional initiatives only: six regional Caritas organisations donated a portion of their proceeds to Caritas organisations affected by the floods so that they could carry out their planned projects despite the emergency situation.

* The Diocesan Caritas Ostrava-Opava also continued to provide humanitarian aid to war-torn Ukraine and, for the eighth time, distributed gifts to underprivileged children as part of its St. Nicholas Day gift-giving. The **DIOCESAN CARITAS PILGRIMAGE IN FULNEK** served as a shared spiritual and community experience. * Significant investments were made in services for seniors, families, and the homeless. **CARITAS OSTRAVA** completed the renovation of the St. Wenceslas Caritas Home – a retirement home which increased its capacity from 60 to 68 beds, added a new emergency lift, and included repairs to a part of the roof. A benefit concert featuring Anna K. and soloists from the Moravian-Silesian National Theatre raised funds for the construction of the new St. Hedwig Caritas Home. * **CARITAS ČESKÝ TĚŠÍN** began renovating the Caritas Home for Peaceful Old Age and was preparing to renovate the



Caritas Home for Mothers in Need. * **CARITAS STUDÉNKA** continued the construction of St. Joachim's Home. * Field and counselling services also expanded. * **CARITAS ODRY** ensured the continued operation of the civic counselling centre, relocated the Assistance Centre for the Homeless to new premises, and, thanks to support from the Moravian-Silesian Region and cooperation with the towns

of Odry and Vítkov, established a personal assistance service for both municipalities. * **CARITAS TŘINEC** established a Caritas home care service, expanded its support for caregivers to include debt counselling, and launched tutoring and recreational activities for children. * **CARITAS OPAVA** organised the 17th nationwide photography contest “My World” (Můj svět), opened the Spojka service centre for people with visual or intellectual disabilities, and renovated the hygiene facilities at the Mraveneček day care centre.

DIOCESAN CARITAS PLZEŇ

* In 2025, the diocese of Plzeň made a significant effort to link domestic aid with long-term international projects. Jagarma Dagvasuren, a Caritas worker from Plzeň, received a Mongolian state award – the Medal of Honor for Meritorious Service – during the state visit of Mongolian President Ukhnaagiin Khurelsukh to the Czech Republic.

* The Diocesan Caritas Plzeň also continued its development aid efforts in South America. In collaboration with Caritas Paraguay and thanks to a donation from the Slovak Catholic Caritas, a project was carried out to build concrete cisterns for collecting rainwater in the Chaco region of Paraguay, where approximately 240 families from poor farming communities are set to get access to drinking water during the dry season. * **THE 9TH CARITAS BALL ORGANISED BY THE DIOCESAN CARITAS PLZEŇ** raised CZK 156,000 for the AMMERE project, which assists teenage mothers and their children living in extreme poverty in Iquitos, Peru. * The development of services in the Czech Republic focused primarily on new or modernised facilities. In Cheb, the Diocesan Caritas Plzeň opened new facilities for its civil counselling centre and crisis assistance services.

* The **REGIONAL CARITAS KLATOVY** launched the



project of Caritas Centre of Our Lady in Čínov, which is intended to serve as a base for nursing services, personal assistance, and home care. At the start of the school year, the Diocesan Caritas Plzeň supported more than 100 children from low-income families through its own school supplies collection and its participation in the nationwide “From the Heart for Schoolchildren” (Školákům od srdce) campaign.

* Support for people from Ukraine also continued at a significant level. Thanks to a grant from the AMIF programme of the Ministry of the Interior, the Diocesan Caritas Plzeň was able to expand its free language courses for refugees, not only in Plzeň but also in Tachov, Bor and Cheb; the offer was supplemented with vocational courses for cooks, waiters and receptionists. * Another significant development was a change in the leadership of the **MUNICIPAL CARITAS PLZEŇ**. Since November 1, it has been led by Tereza Landová, who succeeded long-time director Pavel Janouškovec. On this occasion, both received the special Caritas Heart award at St. Bartholomew’s Cathedral. * At the **ST. GEORGE RETIREMENT HOME**,

six residents turned 100 or older that same year, serving as a heartwarming reminder of the importance of long-term care, relationships, and daily companionship.

ARCHDIOCESAN CARITAS PRAGUE

* In the archdiocese of Prague, the jubilee 25th Three Kings Collection raised CZK 11.3 million and supported hundreds of projects, including the renovation of the St. Wenceslas Home in Stará Boleslav, repairs to the Low-Threshold Day Centre in Nymburk, equipment for the Day Care Centre in Neratovice, and a vehicle for transporting clients of the Day Care Centre in Vlašim. * The Archdiocesan Caritas Prague also expanded its assistance to the homeless during the winter months. In addition to a shelter, night shelters, a day centre, field services, and hot soup distribution, the organisation operated a 100-bed emergency shelter in Troja in cooperation with the city hall and distributed 80 special insulated Sheltersuits to people experiencing homelessness. * Significant investments were made in services for seniors, children, and caregivers. Construction began in Vlašim on new facilities for a day care centre that will serve both seniors and children with multiple disabilities, and **CARITAS VLAŠIM** launched a programme called “Meetings for Caregivers” (Setkání pro pečující). * After a year and a half of extensive renovations, the **ST. WENCESLAS HOME IN STARÁ BOLESLAV**





received the final approval for its main residential building; once the dining facilities and administrative offices are completed, the residents will be able to return from their temporary accommodations. * **CARITAS PŘÍBRAM** was working to strengthen the connection between the day care centre and the café Na Pomezí, where seniors participate in community life. * Caritas organisations in the archdiocese organised eleven summer camps for more than 250 children, including those from difficult family situations, children with disabilities, and those in foster care. * The programme **ADOPCE NA DÁLKU®** (Long-Distance Adoption) continued as part of our foreign aid efforts. In Uganda, Caritas Prague provided nearly 430,000 school lunches for 2,500 children over the course of the year and began building new school kitchens. Grace Mboizi, head of the Caritas mission in Uganda, received the Gratias Agit Award for more than twenty years of service to those who are in need. Construction began on the new Divya Jyothi School in India, and Czech donors helped St. Ignatius Hospital in Honavar acquire a state-of-the-art ultrasound machine. * The Archdiocesan Caritas Prague also marked ten years of supporting compatriots returning to the Czech Republic under the government's resettlement programme. During that time, the organisation has helped 2,300 people with their first steps after arriving, including assistance with paperwork, language, housing, and employment.

GREEK CATHOLIC CARITAS

* The activities of the Greek Catholic Caritas were significantly affected by the ongoing war in Ukraine in 2025 as well. The aid was directed both to Ukrainians who had found refuge in the Czech Republic and directly to those staying in Ukraine. * The Greek Catholic Caritas provided people with temporary protection with spiritual and social support, counselling, material assistance, and a place to gather. It paid special attention to children and families, for whom it organised leisure activities, community programmes, and summer camps. Working with Ukrainian children was one of the most important aspects of its work: the organisation helped them stay connected to their own language and culture, build relationships with their peers, and step out of the shadow of war, if only for a moment. * At the same time, aid continued to be sent to Ukraine, particularly to combat units and people directly affected by the conflict. The Greek Catholic Caritas, in collaboration with Greek Catholic parishes and other charitable organisations, coordinated fundraising efforts to purchase cars, drones, generators, charging stations, clothing, hygiene supplies, medications, vitamins, and other dietary supplements. An understanding of specific needs and the ability to direct aid to places where it could have an immediate impact was really important. * In addition to providing large-scale coordinated assistance, the Greek Catholic Caritas also supported individuals who found themselves in difficult circumstances and needed immediate financial or material aid. * A new development in 2025 was the organisation's first independent participation in the Three Kings Collection, which opened another opportunity to engage the public in supporting charitable work.



THREE KINGS COLLECTION



The year 2025 was exceptional for the Three Kings Collection. It has been 25 years since carollers from the Archdiocese of Olomouc first took to the streets in 2000, and a year later, the entire country followed in their footsteps. What began as an idea from a few enthusiasts has gradually grown into the largest volunteer and one of the longest-running public fundraising campaigns in the Czech Republic. Today, the Three Kings Collection is an integral part of public life in many towns and cities. The tradition is celebrated by tens of thousands of carollers and donors every year.

The Three Kings Collection is more than a fundraising campaign. It provides an opportunity for people of all ages to come together, offering moments of deep human connection, and for many people, it is a much-anticipated event that symbolically kicks off a new year. Although carollers come with a collection box, they also bring wishes for peace and hope. It is precisely this personal aspect that is one of the reasons why the collection continues to enjoy such strong public support even after a quarter of a century.

The collection traditionally takes place in the first two weeks of January – **starting January 1 and lasting till January 14**. Carollers usually participate in groups of three, accompanied by an adult who carries identification and presents it upon request. All collection boxes are sealed, and their numbers correspond to the numbers on the carollers’ ID cards, which is one of the measures ensuring the transparency of the collection.

The proceeds are distributed according to a transparent formula: 65% is used in the location where the collection took place, while the remaining 35% support projects run by diocesan Caritas organisations, foreign aid, and nationwide activities of Caritas Czech Republic. This system makes it possible for local Caritas organisations to help older people, families in need, people with disabilities, the sick and people experiencing homelessness. The Three Kings Collection is one of the pillars for funding aid in all regions.

A JUBILEE YEAR

In 2025, the Three Kings Collection once again proved itself to be the largest and most extensive charity fund-raising event in the country. Donors contributed **CZK 187,995,249**

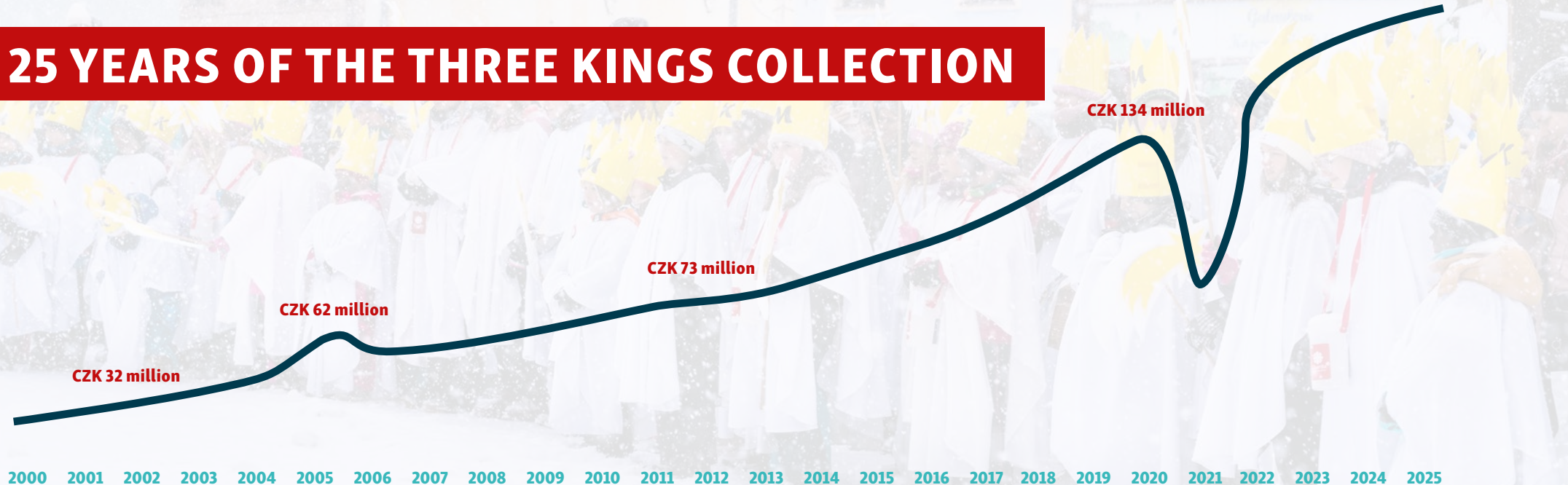

in total. Physical collection boxes accounted for the largest share, bringing in more than **CZK 175 million**, but online fundraising and other cashless forms of donating also play an increasingly significant role. Traditionally, the **Czech Television Three Kings Concert** was also part of the collection, raising more than **CZK 2.7 million** in 2025.

The jubilee year of the collection showed once again that the success of the collection cannot be taken for granted, but depends on the thousands of volunteers, coordinators, and partners who devote their time and energy to it every year. Over the past 25 years, many generations of carollers have participated in the collection, and it has become a natural part of life in many communities.

SOCIAL AND HEALTHCARE SERVICES

Social and healthcare services have long been among the most important areas for Caritas Czech Republic. Our assistance is based on respect for human dignity and the belief that every person has the right to receive support when they need it. Today, Caritas Czech Republic is one of the largest non-governmental providers of social and healthcare services in the country, delivering these services through an extensive nationwide network.





In practice, it is becoming clear that people do not come in with a single, isolated problem, but with a whole range of interconnected issues. Loss of housing, debt, low income, deteriorating health, caring for loved ones, loneliness, job insecurity, or the impacts of crises often compound and worsen one another. It is precisely in these situations that Caritas stands by people who find themselves in difficult circumstances.

We help families with children, single parents, seniors, people experiencing homelessness, victims of domestic violence, people with disabilities, the sick and dying, as well as those trying to escape the debt trap or cope with the consequences of crises that have affected their lives.

An important part of our work also includes **field and mobile services**, which allow us to provide assistance right where people need it.

Social and health needs often overlap. That is why Caritas is expanding not only its **social and healthcare services but also forms of assistance that fall somewhere in between these**. We focus primarily on people who have difficulties with accessing standard care systems, and we seek solutions that are tailored to their specific circumstances.

Our work evolves alongside the evolution of society. That is why, in addition to providing direct assistance to individuals and families, we combine our day-to-day experience in the field with **advocacy work**. It is not enough to wait until someone is already in a crisis situation to take action. It is equally important to prevent these situations.

We are therefore working to ensure more affordable housing, a fairer benefits system, better conditions for debt relief, accessible long-term care, greater support for families and children, decent working conditions, and more stable funding for social and healthcare services. We bring our practical experience to our negotiations with public institutions and to debates on legislation and public policy.



Our goal is to strengthen Caritas Czech Republic as a reliable partner for people in need and for public institutions. We want to be an organisation that not only mitigates the effects of social problems but also actively contributes to solving them. We will continue to defend the interests of vulnerable and disadvantaged people and advocate for changes that lead to greater dignity, justice, and social cohesion.

We therefore **collaborate with several partners at both the national and European levels** and participate in expert working groups, committees, and platforms dedicated to reducing poverty, inequality, and discrimination. We intend to continue this work: with respect for human dignity, an emphasis on solidarity, and the understanding that we must not be indifferent to any person or their circumstances.

COLLABORATION IN OUR ORGANISATION

For Caritas' work, it is necessary to **share good practices and experience**. For this purpose, we use meetings of the **committees** at the diocesan and national levels. These committees provide an expert platform for our workers from the same fields to consult and propose new actions.

In the social and healthcare area, nine specialised committees work at the national level:

- * Committee on shelters for mothers with children in need
- * Migration committee
- * Committee on counselling centres
- * Committee on social activation services for families with children
- * Committee on social workers – methodologists
- * Committee on social projects
- * Committee on social services for people experiencing homelessness
- * Committee on social services for seniors
- * Healthcare committee

CARITAS' SERVICES

In 2025, we provided more than **1,445 services** within the nationwide Caritas network. Social services are registered pursuant to Act No. 108/2006 Coll., on Social Services, which classifies them into three groups:

- * specialised social counselling
- * social care services
- * social prevention services

In the overall list, we also include:

- * **healthcare services**
- * **other services** (i.e. supplementary and supporting services that cannot be included in the above-mentioned categories)

SPECIALISED SOCIAL COUNSELLING CENTRES

Counselling-centre employees assist clients in dealing with government offices, mediate necessary assistance for them, and focus on areas such as labour-law relations, housing, family, interpersonal relationships and property-rights matters. They help people in need navigate their difficult life situations and find possible ways to solve them.

Caritas has **85 specialized counselling centres** which carried out a total of 207,352 contacts and interventions in 2025 **helping 53,549 individuals**.

Out of the total of 85 counselling centres, **66 provide basic civic counselling**. Out of this number of counselling centres, **52 provide debt counselling** and 43 are accredited to write and file insolvency petitions. In 2025, debt counselling centres provided help to 9,662 clients.

The total number of debt counselling contacts and interventions was 68,799.

SOCIAL CARE SERVICES

Caritas’ social care services provide support to people whose ability to care for themselves is limited due to a health condition or disability and who need assistance from others in their daily lives. Family members or other close relatives are not always able to provide them with the support they need. **In 2025, Caritas operated 366 social services, which were used by 27,955 clients that year.**

This primarily involved field care services and personal assistance, as well as emergency care and support for independent living. Respite services help people who take care of their loved ones themselves. Day service centres, as well as daily and weekly care centres, are also available. If users’ circumstances prevent them from remaining in their natural environment, Caritas also

offers residential services, such as nursing homes, special-care facilities, or assisted living.

In terms of scope, the most significant services are home care services, of which Caritas provided 113. In 2025, 17,819 clients used these services, and care-givers performed 4,467,663 care tasks as part of them.

SOCIAL PREVENTION SERVICES

In 2025, the social prevention sector offered **358 registered services**, which were **used by a total of 49,460 clients**. These services help prevent the social exclusion of people at risk due to crisis situations, socially disadvantaged environments, unhealthy lifestyles, or other adverse

circumstances. Their goal is to support clients in overcoming difficult life situations while also preventing the emergence and spread of undesirable social phenomena.

One of the groups these services are intended for is people experiencing homelessness. They can find immediate assistance – such as access to hygiene facilities, meals, or rest – **at low-threshold day centres**. In 2025, Caritas registered **251,712 visits and recorded 703,490 actions**. One-off assistance and places to sleep are provided by hostels, which strive to motivate their clients to use related social and public services. Caritas also operates **21 shelters for men and women**, providing clients with temporary housing, support in coping with difficult life situations, and the necessary emotional support. In 2025, a total of **1,282 people took advantage of this assistance, 792 of whom were new clients**.

Family shelters provide refuge for mothers or fathers with children who are in need. In 2025, a total of **3,413 parents and children** (comprising 1,019 families) were afforded housing in these shelters. **A total of 1,753 parents and children sought shelter in shelters for the first time**. Field programmes also play an important role in the long-term fight against poverty and social exclusion; **in 2025, they recorded more than 98,407 contacts and interventions**.

We are seeing a significant increase in the number of new clients at our shelters. According to our data, the total number of clients at shelters for men and women is slightly lower than in 2024, but the percentage of new clients is significantly higher; similarly, at shelters for families, the total number remains nearly the same, but the number of first-time clients increased significantly compared to 2024. This can be interpreted as a sign of

ongoing housing instability and the fact that new households are affected by the crisis.

Social activation services for families with children, seniors and persons with disabilities are also offered in the field. **Low-threshold clubs for children and young**

people from disadvantaged backgrounds provide a safe space for children and adolescents; **8,201 attended them in 2025**. Families with children whose development is at risk are supported by **early care services**. The individual services and numbers are summarised in the table below:

HEALTHCARE SERVICES

Caritas Czech Republic is the biggest provider of healthcare services in the country. In 2025, the organisation had a total of 169 registered healthcare facilities throughout the Czech Republic. These employed 1,532 nurses who provided care to 61,552 patients in 2025.

HOME HEALTHCARE

The main pillar of the health services offered by Caritas Czech Republic is **home healthcare**, which was provided by **78 centres** in 2025. They employed **914 nurses** who provided expert care to **52,051 patients** in the familiar surroundings of their homes. Most of these centres also provide **home hospice care** as an integral part of supporting terminally ill patients.

MOBILE SPECIALISED PALLIATIVE CARE

This highly specialised service enables people in the terminal stages of illness to stay at home with their loved ones until the end of their lives. In 2025, **117 specialist doctors and 186 nurses** were working in **19 mobile specialist palliative care teams**. Together, they treated **2,736 patients** with serious complications who were in an unstable condition. For **540 patients**, the 30-day period covered by health insurance was exceeded, so the costs of care had to be covered by other resources.

INPATIENT HOSPICE

Caritas Czech Republic operates **four inpatient hospices** with a total capacity of **140 beds**. Last year, **79 nurses and 46 doctors** took care of **1,353 dying people** in these hospices. The inpatient hospices are closely connected with both outpatient care and mobile specialised palliative care. It is thus possible to find the optimum care for every patient based on their specific illness and social circumstances, as well as to provide respite stays.

OUTPATIENT AND OTHER HEALTHCARE SERVICES

Caritas Czech Republic operates **20 outpatient and other healthcare services** – a pain clinic, palliative medicine and physiotherapy outpatient clinic, a general practitioner clinic for people in need, a psychiatric and neurological outpatient clinic, a facility for follow-up and inpatient care, a mental health centre and a weekly residential care centre, which is linked to the palliative and hospice care provided. During the year, these facilities served **3,066 patients** and employed **27 nurses and physiotherapists and 25 doctors**.

HEALTHCARE IN RESIDENTIAL FACILITIES

Through its nurses, Caritas provides healthcare at all **48 care homes for older people and homes with a special regime**. The residential facilities employ **326 nurses**. They treated **2,346 patients** in 2025. Czech Catholic Caritas no longer operates homes for members of religious orders. The facilities were closed or transferred to Caritas Czech Republic.

EXPERTISE, COMPASSION, AND TECHNOLOGICAL DEVELOPMENT IN HEALTHCARE SERVICES PROVIDED BY CARITAS

Caritas Czech Republic reaffirms its position as a leader in the provision of comprehensive healthcare. Thanks to the high level of expertise of our teams and the use of modern technologies such as **telehealth**, we are enabling an ever-wider range of patients to recover in the comfort of their own homes. Our care covers a wide range of conditions – from patients undergoing same-day surgery and those with injuries to individuals with chronic heart failure or the after-effects of strokes. In home care, Caritas nurses treat patients who are increasingly ill and require more intensive nursing care. For Caritas, **integrating medical and social care** for these patients is a matter of course.



PALLIATIVE CARE AND A DIGNIFIED END OF LIFE

The key goal is to enable as many people as possible to spend the final days of their lives at home, surrounded by their loved ones. However, we continue to **face the problem of the underfunding of mobile palliative care by health insurance companies**. We expected some improvement thanks to the new reimbursement regulation, which now considers procedures related to the initiation and termination of care. However, nearly half of the costs of palliative care remain uncovered.

HEALTHCARE IN RESIDENTIAL FACILITIES

Our residential facilities provide 24-hour professional medical care to those who, due to their health condition or cognitive impairments, can no longer live independently. Thanks to our close collaboration with mobile palliative care teams right here in our facilities, we have been able to **rapidly reduce the number of unnecessary hospitalisations**. This allows clients to remain in a familiar environment, surrounded by love and professional care, even in the final stages of their lives.



ON OUR WAY TO QUALITY AND ACCREDITATION

Thanks to the QSOP mobile app, which was specifically developed for Caritas' healthcare, we have been able to **standardise nursing procedures across our network**, thereby accelerating the preparation of all our facilities for **SAK accreditation** (provided by the Joint Accreditation Committee), which guarantees a high and measurable standard of service.



QUALITAS OPTIMA: SUPPORT AND APPRECIATION OF OUR NURSES

The professional association **Qualitas Optima 2020**, founded on the initiative of Caritas nurses, plays an irreplaceable role in the development of nursing. It focuses on the education and professional development of non-medical staff in home care, hospice care, and residential care.

- ✳ **Education:** Organisation of 10 specialised healthcare webinars.
- ✳ **Conferences:** Participation in professional conferences – One-Day Surgery, Mobile Hospice Forums, GF913, Volunteering in Healthcare, etc.
- ✳ **Caritas Nurse of the Year Award:** In 2025, the second annual Qualitas Optima Awards ceremony was held in the Hall of Cardinal Beran at the Archdiocese of Prague (for more information, see p. 11).

HOUSING

We are striving to address the issue of unaffordable housing by running social apartments, which we provide at affordable rents to poor people who do not have the possibility of obtaining housing under the current conditions. A total of **572 people, including 249 children**, lived in **186 social apartments**, 93 of which are part of Caritas' property and 93 of which are leased from other entities. A total of **225 clients**, including **65 children**, found shelter in **6 lodging houses**.

SOCIAL ENTERPRISES

Caritas organisations also operate **18 social enterprises** through their network. These businesses operate in various sectors, including sewing workshops and laundries, bakeries and pastry shops, spa wafer factories, cafés, businesses specialising in furniture restoration and manufacturing, meal preparation and delivery, the production and sale of items such as medical supplies, syrups, or textile products, thrift stores, graphic design studios, and cleaning and waste disposal services.



The social economy and social enterprises are areas on which Caritas also focuses in its advocacy activities. We view social entrepreneurship as a form of business that creates significant social value. Social enterprises provide employment opportunities for people who, due to their health limitations or other disadvantages, would often find it very difficult to find a job on the regular labour market.



VOLUNTEERS



Volunteering is an integral part of the activities of Caritas Czech Republic. Our services, events, and day-to-day support rely on people who have chosen to devote their time, energy, and skills to helping others. Volunteers help wherever human connection, practical assistance, and a willingness to do something more are needed. Thanks to them, our aid can be wide-reaching, available and, in many cases, more human.

Throughout 2025, a total of **84,494 volunteers** participated in the volunteer activities of Caritas Czech Republic, including volunteers collecting donations for the Three Kings Collection and those involved in crisis assistance. Together, they worked for **414,670 hours**, which is equivalent to **17,278 days**, i.e. **47.3 years of uninterrupted help**.

Once again, the most significant volunteers’ engagement was related to the **Three Kings Collection** in 2025. **78,952 volunteers** were involved in carolling and preparing the collection, devoting **266,240 hours** to this work. That is **11,093 days**, i.e. approx. **30.4 years** of volunteering.

In addition to the Three Kings Collection, volunteers participated in both **accredited and non-accredited programmes**, with **2,332 long-term and 3,199 short-term engagements**. Including emergency aid, volunteering outside of the Three Kings Collection accounted for an additional **148,430 hours** of assistance.

Volunteering had many different faces in 2025. Volunteers visited clients in their homes, accompanied them to doctor’s appointments or authorities, helped with tutoring children, and supported seniors, people with disabilities, and families facing difficult life situations. They also participated in dog-assisted therapy, meal distribution, the organisation of cultural and sporting events, food and clothing collections, and provided administrative, professional, and technical support.

Organisations that reported volunteer activities in 2025 carried out, on average, approximately ten different types of volunteer activities per archdiocesan/diocesan Caritas organisation. At Caritas Czech Republic, volunteering is not merely a supplement to our services, but a natural and integral part of them, expanding the scope of our assistance and strengthening the personal dimension of our support.

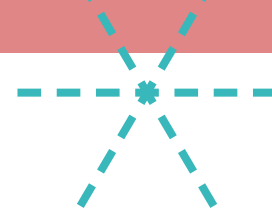

MARIANEUM HOTEL AND TRAINING CENTRE



In 2025, the Marianeum Hotel and Training Centre, operated by Caritas Czech Republic in the Vinohrady district of Prague, continued to combine high-quality hotel and conference services with the values that underpin our charitable work. Proceeds from its operations continue to support people in need – at home and abroad.

It offers accommodation in single, double and triple rooms and a family suite. There is a cosy courtyard garden available to guests, ideal for relaxing and enjoying a barbecue. A stay at the Marianeum Hotel offers added value – **by staying with us, each guest contributes to the activities of Caritas Czech Republic.**

The hotel also offers **modern training facilities with conference rooms** of various capacities ranging from 10 to 50 people, and up to 60 seats in the auditorium. Various lectures, seminars, educational programmes and international conferences are regularly held here. Thanks to its excellent location and pleasant atmosphere, Marianeum is also popular among guests from the general public.



The Marianeum Hotel also has extensive experience in **providing catering and banquet services**, not only for Caritas events but also for other clients. In addition to providing accommodation and renting conference rooms, we also provide catering services for seminars, training sessions, company meetings, Christmas parties, private celebrations, and team-building events. Our offer includes coffee breaks, snacks, and outdoor BBQs, and the hotel can accommodate events for up to 200 people.

A YEAR MARKED BY COMPLETION, RENEWAL AND NEW SERVICES

2025 was, above all, a year of significant operational and technical progress for Marianeum. After long preparations, a **new kitchen was finally completed**, enabling the hotel to start preparing its own meals and further develop its dining services. Along with the kitchen, new and more comfortable facilities for employees were also created, including a fully equipped changing room with lockers, a toilet and a shower. A new water heater for the entire hotel and a renovation of the lift doors on all floors also improved the overall quality of our service.

Renovation of the building also continued. A gradual renovation of all the windows has begun and will continue. These investments enhance the comfort of both guests and employees while contributing to the hotel's long-term sustainability.

There were also updates to the services offered. Marianeum started baking its own bread, enriching our offer and reinforcing the hotel's unique character. Water dispensers are now available in the training rooms and during breakfast, offering chilled still and sparkling water, as well as hot water for tea. They use UV sterilisation and silver filtration, making them a modern and eco-friendly solution for drinks offer.

In line with our values, we continue to develop sustainable operation. We naturally sort waste, save energy and use environmentally friendly products. When replacing equipment, we focus on the longevity and recyclability of materials.

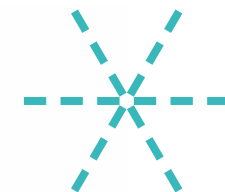

INTEGRATION OF FOREIGN NATIONALS



We help migrants and refugees gain greater stability in the Czech Republic. We help them find their way in the Czech environment, understand their rights and responsibilities, cope with everyday situations, and gradually become an independent part of society.

Our work is based on **free professional social and legal counselling**. This is complemented by other integration services: individual consultations, assistance in communicating with authorities and institutions, accompaniment services, interpretation, low-threshold Czech language courses, sociocultural orientation courses, tutoring for children, leisure and community activities, adaptation programmes, psychosocial support, and food and material assistance. We provide all our services free of charge, impartially, discreetly, and with respect for the dignity of every person.

As in previous years, the **year 2025** was significantly **influenced by the ongoing war in Ukraine and the presence of a large number of refugees in the Czech Republic**. Caritas services therefore focused primarily on helping to stabilise their living situation. Caritas staff helped clients find housing, jobs,

and schools for their children; assisted them in dealing with authorities; accompanied them to medical appointments; and helped them navigate the Czech system. An important part of the assistance provided included Czech language lessons, adaptation and community activities, psychological and spiritual support, and, when needed, material assistance as well.

Community centres in Litoměřice, Plzeň, and Prague provided a safe space for both children and adults. For many clients, these centres have become a place where they can obtain practical information, share their experience, meet new people, and feel a sense of belonging. Refugees could also access **counselling and integration services in Olomouc and Ostrava**. Registered professional social and legal counselling services were provided by **counselling centres for foreigners and refugees in Brno, České Budějovice, Hradec Králové, Litoměřice, Moravská Třebová, Plzeň, and Prague**.

Another key component of integration support was the provision of assistance and interpretation services at nine offices of the Department of Asylum and Migration Policy of the Ministry of the Interior during the process of applying for and extending residence permits. Interpreters and intercultural workers assisted clients with administrative matters and accompanied them to government offices, schools, healthcare facilities, and other institutions. This helped prevent misunderstandings that could unnecessarily prolong the proceedings or make clients' already difficult circumstances even worse.

A number of Caritas organisations organised **low-threshold Czech language courses and sociocultural orientation courses**. It is precisely knowledge of the language and the basic rules of society that are among the most important prerequisites for independence. Multicultural events, such as the **Meeting of Nations in Hradec Králové** or **International Haná in Olomouc**, also brought residents and newcomers together and helped break down prejudices. The Archdiocesan Caritas Prague also supported the integration of displaced compatriots, including those from Ukraine and Venezuela.

Volunteers played an important role in integration efforts. They were involved in tutoring children, organising leisure activities and trips, including through the Greek Catholic Caritas, as well as other forms of support. Their help was not only practical, but it also helped to connect local communities with people who are starting over in the Czech Republic.

The **Integration Hotline** provided interpretation services, information, and psychosocial support in Ukrainian, Mongolian, and Vietnamese, thereby assisting a total of **5,183 foreign nationals** with their integration.

The service was co-funded by the Prague City Hall, the Ministry of the Interior, the ESF’s Employment Plus Operational Program, and other sources.

In addition to providing direct assistance to individual clients, Caritas also works systematically to **reduce systemic barriers**. We draw on our experience in counselling and fieldwork to identify recurring issues related to residence matters, access to services, and social integration. Caritas representatives participate in working groups focused on migration, adaptation, and integration; they collaborate with state authorities, local governments, and other organisations; and they contribute to the review of legislative proposals. The aim of this **advocacy work** is to help ensure that the conditions for newcomers are fair, effective, and contribute to long-term coexistence.

In 2025, integration services provided by Caritas helped stabilise the living conditions of migrants and refugees throughout the Czech Republic. Clients gained greater confidence when dealing with institutions, became more familiar with the Czech system, and strengthened their ability to handle everyday situations on their own. Special attention was given to children and vulnerable individuals, for whom this support helped mitigate the effects of forced migration, prolonged uncertainty, and social isolation. At the same time, community and volunteer activities helped strengthen ties between newcomers and local inhabitants.

HELP FOR UKRAINE IN 2025

In 2025, Caritas Czech Republic continued to provide support to people whose lives had been disrupted by the war in Ukraine. The aid was directed to war-torn areas and regions near the front lines, as well as to those who had found temporary refuge in other parts of Ukraine or in the Czech Republic.

CARITAS FOR UKRAINE COLLECTION CONTINUES

The public **Caritas for Ukraine collection** raised CZK 185.7 million during the four years of its existence. A total of



CZK 94.671 million was used for aid in 2025, with funds coming from both public donations and institutional funding. During the year, Caritas provided assistance to **88,612 refugees** in the Czech Republic, and to tens of thousands more in Ukraine.

HELP FOR PEOPLE AFFECTED BY THE WAR IN UKRAINE

In Ukraine itself, Caritas Czech Republic focused primarily on areas essential for a dignified life during the long-term crisis: **healthcare, mental health, education, and basic humanitarian aid**. In 2025, in collaboration with institutional donors, Czech and local partners, and donors to Caritas for Ukraine collection, we:

- * renovated and equipped **six rehabilitation wards in hospitals in the Dnipropetrovsk region**
- * helped to establish **five mental health centres in four regions**
- * provided **medical care to 1,500 people** through modular medical centres in the Kherson region
- * built **five safe educational centres for children** in Nikopol and Mykolaivka

Our help also took a very practical form: 740 households near the front lines received solid heating fuel, and Caritas also arranged hundreds of hours of tutoring for students whose education was disrupted by repeated attacks. We also continued our efforts to repair and furnish accommodation centres for internally displaced persons.

Activities of regional Caritas organisations also played a significant role.

In 2025, the **ARCHDIOCESAN CARITAS OLOMOUC** provided approximately **CZK 3.7 million** to support projects in Ukraine; the aid was directed, among other things, toward psychosocial and legal support for families affected by the war, as well as support for education, housing, and the provision of drinking water.

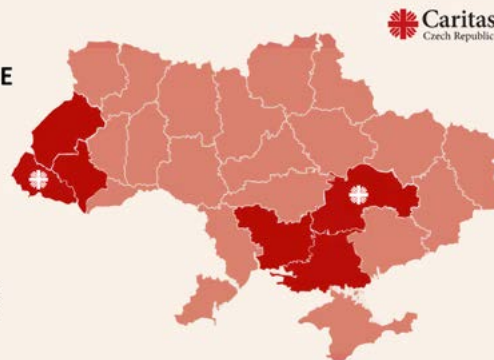
The **DIOCESAN CARITAS OSTRAVA-OPAVA** provided aid totalling **CZK 6.541 million**, focusing primarily on the distribution of food, hygiene supplies, and medical supplies in the eastern part of the country, as well as on evacuations from combat zones.

The **REGIONAL CARITAS ZNOJMO** distributed financial aid totalling **CZK 3.065 million** and material aid worth **CZK 753,000**. Among other things, the organisation supported the “Point of Resilience” in Verkhnodniprovsk, care services, medical treatment for children, and assistance for displaced families.





HELP FOR UKRAINIAN REFUGEES

The assistance provided to people who had fled the war to the Czech Republic was equally important. Caritas provided professional social and legal counselling, assistance with visits to authorities, interpretation services, help with finding housing and employment, and support with enrolling children in school. The network of eight **counselling centres** in Brno, České Budějovice, Hradec Králové, Litoměřice, Olomouc, Ostrava, Plzeň, and Prague was supplemented by four **community centres** and one **integration centre**. Their services also included Czech language courses, sociocultural orientation, leisure and community activities, and psychological support. Our **integration hotline**, which provided information, interpretation services, and psychosocial support, also continued to operate (for more information, see p. 37).

The year 2025 also demonstrated that aid to refugees can no longer be viewed merely as a short-term crisis response. Caritas Czech Republic was part of the **international Ukraine Refugee Response Learning Platform**, which compiled the experience of charitable organisations from Central and Eastern Europe. **The final report** highlighted five key areas for further support: employment and livelihoods, education, safe return, psychosocial support, and individual work with clients. It is precisely in these areas that it becomes clear that long-term assistance must combine a humanitarian dimension with integration, professional guidance, and advocacy. In 2025, Caritas did not merely help to alleviate the most urgent needs but also worked to create conditions for a safer and more dignified life for people affected by the war.



HUMANITARIAN AID AND DEVELOPMENT COOPERATION

For more than twenty years, we have been helping in places where people's lives are affected by conflict, poverty, natural disasters, climate change, or the loss of livelihoods. We provide quick humanitarian aid during crises while also developing long-term projects that enable people to regain stability, security, and greater self-sufficiency.

Through the global network of **Caritas Internationalis**, of which we are a part, we systematically engage in international cooperation and work together to respond to crises around the world. By 2025, we were operating in **seven countries through our own foreign offices** and we were also carrying out projects in other regions. During the year, we also concluded our long-term programmes in Iraq and Mongolia. In total, we directly supported approximately 80,000 people around the world.

Our goal is not just to provide one-time assistance, but to achieve a long-term, systematic, and measurable impact. We are committed to the efficient use of resources, transparency, and collaboration with local communities, organisations, and public institutions. **We help all people in need, without distinction, and we are guided by the principles of humanity, impartiality, and non-discrimination.** Our long-term partners include the European Union, the United Nations, the Ministry of Foreign Affairs of the Czech Republic, CzechAid, Czech and foreign embassies, the Caritas global network, and other international and local partners.

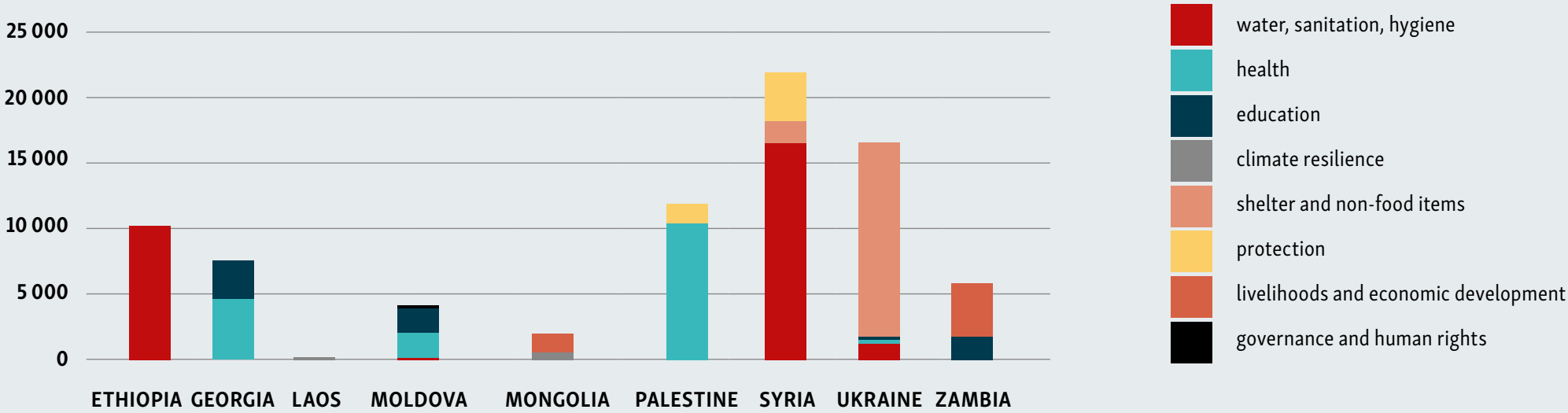

OUR MAIN AREAS OF ASSISTANCE

We focus on several strategic areas – **humanitarian aid, healthcare and social services, and inclusive economic development**. In practice, this means that we respond to immediate threats to life and dignity, while also helping to strengthen the systems that enable people to cope with crises over the long term.

Our activities are based on a thorough analysis of local needs. We draw on Czech expertise, data, innovation, and collaboration with specialised institutions. We design solutions tailored to the specific context and in collaboration with the people and communities directly affected.

EXAMPLES OF HUMANITARIAN AID IN 2025

HEALTH AND PSYCHOSOCIAL CARE IN GAZA

In the Gaza Strip, we continued to provide emergency humanitarian aid focused on medical and psychosocial care. We built on the activities from the previous year and, in collaboration with local partners, we expanded our services, particularly in the area of Khan Younis.

Under extremely challenging conditions, we helped provide basic healthcare, treatment for chronic illnesses, distribution of medicines, and psychosocial support to people affected by war and displacement. Our assistance included individual counselling and, newly, support for the operation of a free crisis hotline. This made it possible to

provide support even to people who were unable to visit healthcare facilities due to the security situation.

We also gave the Czech public a glimpse into our aid efforts in Gaza through a travelling photo exhibition this fall titled **“Gaza Beyond the Headlines”** (Gaza skrytá za palcovými titulky) which showcased the daily lives of civilians and the work of local partners beyond the scope of brief media reports (for more, see p. 9).

SUPPORT FOR REFUGEE COMMUNITIES IN ZAMBIA

In the Zambian border refugee settlements of Meheba and Mayukwayukwa, we have long been supporting socio-economic integration, self-sufficiency, and educational stability. For more than a decade, Meheba has been successfully strengthening the economic resilience of



EXAMPLES OF AID IN HEALTHCARE AND SOCIAL SERVICES DEVELOPMENT IN 2025

MORE ACCESSIBLE HEALTHCARE IN GEORGIA

In Georgia, we focused on strengthening primary healthcare, early childhood care, the development of healthcare staff. In collaboration with national institutions, UNICEF, WHO, and other partners, we supported systemic reforms that emphasise prevention, quality of care, and better coordination among services.

We contributed to the development of early intervention services for young children. More than 100 children at-risk gained access to new services, and dozens of specialists and supervisors received professional training. Improvements were also made in maternal and child healthcare through updated clinical protocols, training for healthcare workers, and teleconsultations in areas where access to care is limited.

These activities also included strengthening the vaccination system, utilising digital tools, and launching communication campaigns. In the field of cancer prevention and treatment, we have supported implementation of clinical practices, digitisation of medical records, and training of healthcare professionals. This integrated approach helps improve the quality of healthcare services nationwide over the long term.

HEMOCARE IN MOLDOVA

Over the past three years, we have supported the development of home care in Moldova to improve the quality of life for seniors and other vulnerable people, particularly in remote

regions. New services, including occupational therapy and intergenerational activities, were introduced on a pilot basis at five centres, expanding upon traditional forms of care.

These innovations have helped increase clients' self-sufficiency, improve their physical and mental well-being, and alleviate social isolation. The project also included training for social and healthcare workers, support for service planning, and efforts to ensure their financial sustainability. The project thus helped build a more resilient home care system based on human dignity and individual needs.



more than 2,300 households, which, thanks to their higher incomes, are now able to pay for their children's school fees and supplies.

Key activities, such as rice processing, the construction of irrigation systems, and brick production, continue to operate even after the projects have ended. Sharing experience is also a key component: more than 90 percent of vocational course graduates rate the training as professional, and many of them now serve as mentors for other community members.

In Mayukwayukwa, we supported the development of agricultural value chains and market connections. As a result, the economic self-sufficiency of more than a thousand households has been strengthened. At the same time, communities are adopting climate-friendly solutions that help them better cope with drought and other impacts of climate change.

EXAMPLES OF SUPPORT FOR INCLUSIVE ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT IN 2025

SUSTAINABLE AGRICULTURE IN ZAMBIA

From 2023 to 2025, we supported smallholder farmers in the Monza region of Zambia to better cope with the impacts of climate change and market their products more effectively. The project brought together sustainable agriculture, development of irrigation systems, financial inclusion, and green entrepreneurship.

Direct support was provided to 1,754 farmers, who received training in collaboration with, among others, the Ministry of Agriculture of Zambia. Most of them increased their productivity and started using sustainable practices, such as crop rotation or composting.

A total of 158 savings groups were established, with savings exceeding CZK 2.7 million, and 59 percent of farmers gained access to new markets. A technical analysis of irrigation systems recommended the use of solar-powered and drip irrigation, as well as rainwater harvesting. Three demonstration units were built, and farmers, representatives of government agencies, and private-sector representatives were trained. The project also helped five companies transition to more environmentally friendly operations.

WASTE MANAGEMENT IN LAOS

In Laos, we focused on green and circular economy in 2025. Two research studies focused on reducing single-use plastics and developing more sustainable waste management practices in the cities of Kaysone and Thakhek.

34 PROJECTS IN 10 COUNTRIES

An analysis of plastic waste flows identified the main sources of consumption, particularly the high usage of plastic bags. At the same time, it highlighted the significant

role played by women, who make up a large proportion of retail business owners. A technical and economic study has confirmed that PET bottles are currently the most suitable material for large-scale recycling within the circular economy. The project thus provided important input for further steps toward a more sustainable waste management.

GLOBAL EDUCATION AND AWARENESS

YOUNG CARITAS NETWORK IN 2025



In 2025, the Global Education and Awareness Department continued to develop initiatives that strengthen solidarity, promote volunteering, and encourage young people to become active citizens. Our long-term goal is to contribute to a society that is open, respects diversity, and is mindful of its responsibilities at both the local and global levels. We view global education as a path to understanding the interconnections of the modern world and to actively engaging people in its positive transformation.

Hundreds of young people, teachers, youth workers, and other stakeholders participated in the programmes of the Global Education and Awareness Department throughout the year. Experience has repeatedly shown us that real change happens when people have trust, space for dialogue and an opportunity to take responsibility. That is precisely why, through the Young Caritas network, we provide long-term guidance and support to young people, helping them become active participants in their communities.



INTERNATIONAL VOLUNTEERING: AN EXPERIENCE THAT CHANGES YOUR PERSPECTIVE

The year 2025 marked the final year of the three-year period during which **volunteers were deployed as part of the EVOCA project**. A total of seven volunteers participated in international programmes offered by Caritas, working in Zambia, Georgia, and Iraq, and collectively contributing more than 8,800 hours of service. Their involvement provided support for local projects while also allowing volunteers to gain practical experience in humanitarian and development work across a variety of cultural and social contexts. An important step was a successful renewal of our volunteer accreditation, which allows us to further develop these activities in the future.

SCHOOLS AS A PLACE WHERE SOLIDARITY MAKES SENSE

A significant part of the work of the Global Education and Awareness Raising Department involves **collaboration with primary and secondary schools**. In 2025, we partnered with two new schools and reached dozens of teachers and hundreds of students through workshops and educational activities. We incorporated the themes of solidarity, sustainability, and global responsibility into our teaching, with an emphasis on active participation and a connection to the real world.

We offered educators methodological support and specific tools – ranging from interactive workshops to an online library. These formats provide a safe space for engaging with diverse life experience and foster development of critical thinking and empathy in young people.

A TIME OF SOLIDARITY: UNDERSTANDING IN UNCERTAIN TIMES

To respond to current social challenges, we carried out **activities aimed at promoting dialogue and understanding**. Seven authentic stories of young people who experienced war and forced migration were added to the online library. These stories serve as educational resources for teaching and youth work and help address sensitive topics with respect and an emphasis on human dignity.

YOUNG CARITAS AS A PLATFORM FOR INNOVATION

In 2025, we continued to develop the **Young Caritas network** as a platform for sharing, collaboration, and mutual learning. Dozens of staff members and hundreds of young people across the Czech Republic are involved in its operations. A highlight of the year was a May meeting of approximately 70 network staff members, focused on sharing best practices and developing innovative approaches to youth work.

The **Young Caritas Advocates** project, which aims to support young people's participation and involvement in specific changes in their communities, received an **award at the Caritas Europa Innovation Festival**. This recognition confirmed the value of our long-term work with young people at both the local and international levels.

YOUNG PEOPLE AS AGENTS OF CHANGE

Throughout the year, we organised a number of international and local activities designed to **encourage young people to get involved**. The international training session in Prague was attended by 40 young people from 12 countries, who developed their skills in the areas of social innovation, civic engagement, and responding to current challenges. Dozens more young people took part in ideathons, workshops, and long-term mentoring programmes.

The **Young Caritas Club** also remains a part of our offer, providing regular meetings, support for volunteer initiatives, and a space for sharing experiences.

2030 GAME

Thanks to the 2030 card game, we were able to spark a **discussion about the future of our planet** with teachers and youth workers, as well as with dozens of young people at schools and club meetings. The game offers a unique insight into the principles of humanitarian aid and international development cooperation and



demonstrates in a practical way that effective aid is not just about one-off donations, but about building long-term community resilience and sustainable development.

OUTLOOK FOR THE COMING PERIOD

In 2026, we want to build on our work to date and continue to develop it. We will focus on making volunteering accessible to a wider range of people, bridging the generational gap, and exploring new ways to engage the public. We plan to develop interactive educational formats – from games and podcasts to other innovative tools – that will enable people to experience solidarity.

We believe that a combination of trust, responsibility, and courage creates a solid foundation for a society that can cope with the challenges of today and tomorrow.

SCOPE OF OUR ACTIVITIES AND FINANCIAL RESOURCES

The scope of activities of the Global Education and Awareness Department in 2025 was made possible by

combining national and international resources. We have carried out projects funded by programmes such as Erasmus+, the European Solidarity Corps, the International Visegrad Fund, grants from the City of Prague, and funds from Caritas Czech Republic, including proceeds from the Three Kings Collection.

The financial support was directed toward both international volunteering and educational and participatory projects for children and young people, as well as work with schools and the development of the Young Caritas network. The individual projects were implemented over varying time frames and with budgets of varying sizes, which made it possible to respond to current social needs while maintaining the continuity of long-term programmes.

FINANCIAL SECTION

COMMENTS ON THE FINANCIAL RESULTS FOR 2025

In 2025, Caritas Czech Republic proved to be an organisation capable of adapting to changing funding conditions while maintaining the continuity of the provided aid. Even though we faced a challenging environment, key programmes remained stable and focused on making a real difference for people receiving aid from Caritas Czech Republic.

This year, funding relied more heavily on grants, which confirmed our partners' confidence in Caritas Czech Republic and its ability to carry out high-quality projects in line with the objectives. At the same time, we continued to improve our professional donor care and engagement with our donor community. It is precisely in this area that the development of fundraising channels – particularly public fundraising campaigns and donor programmes – still holds significant potential, which could lead to an even more diverse and resilient mix of financial resources in the future.

At the same time, Caritas Czech Republic continues to prove that it manages its finances efficiently, with a focus on the effective use of funds, and the organisation can flexibly redirect resources to where they are most needed. There is an increased focus on activities in the Czech Republic as well as on economic activities, the proceeds of which support the funding of core operations and contribute to the long-term sustainability of aid provided to people in need.

The financial result shifted from a surplus to a slight deficit when compared to the previous year. This was

caused primarily by our revenue decreasing faster than we were able to adapt our expenditure. However, this development also shows the organisation's transparent and accountable management.

THE TOTAL FINANCIAL RESULT AFTER TAX FOR 2025 IS A LOSS OF CZK 1,397,000.

The financial result is influenced by significant exchange-rate losses connected with foreign activities.

The foreign exchange losses were related to exchange rate movements during 2025 and to the timing of transfers and withdrawals of funds in foreign currencies. However, given the nature of project implementation, there is generally little room to influence the timing.

THE TOTAL VOLUME OF COSTS FOR 2025 AMOUNTS TO CZK 276,934,000.

Caritas Czech Republic distributes its spendings on its activities according to the focus of the specific departments: humanitarian aid and development

cooperation, advocacy activities, education and awareness. Expert matters are supported by the communication and fundraising departments, and administrative and operational matters are handled by the economic and administrative department together with the secretariat.

In 2025, 73% of the total costs went to foreign activities and 18% to activities in the Czech Republic. The remaining 9% was allocated to administrative and management costs (4%) and economic activities (5%), which primarily consist of the operation of the Marianum Hotel and Training Centre, which provides accommodation, conference and catering services in the attractive Vinohrady district of Prague. Domestic activities focus primarily on support and collaboration within the Caritas network in the Czech Republic and cover social, health, and migration advocacy and project areas.

THE TOTAL VOLUME OF REVENUE FOR 2025 AMOUNTED TO CZK 275,537,000.

The financial resources of Caritas Czech Republic have long been based on four fundamental pillars. The largest

portion consists of grant funding (69%), both domestic and foreign. Fundraising revenues accounted for 21%; contributions from individual and corporate donors to public fundraising campaigns and donor projects are tracked separately. Revenues from economic activities represent 5% and are used to support the funding of projects in the Czech Republic and abroad, including the organisation's development and investments in this area. The remaining 5% comes from other activities, i.e., funds derived from non-economic activities carried out as part of the core operations of Caritas Czech Republic.

AUDITOR

The auditor confirmed in its statement that the accounts of Caritas Czech Republic were kept and the financial statements were compiled in accordance with Act No. 563/1991 Coll., on Accounting, and Decree No. 504/2002 Coll. (as amended), which is an implementing decree to the aforementioned Act for accounting units using the double-entry bookkeeping system, in the case of which conducting business is not the principal subject of activity.

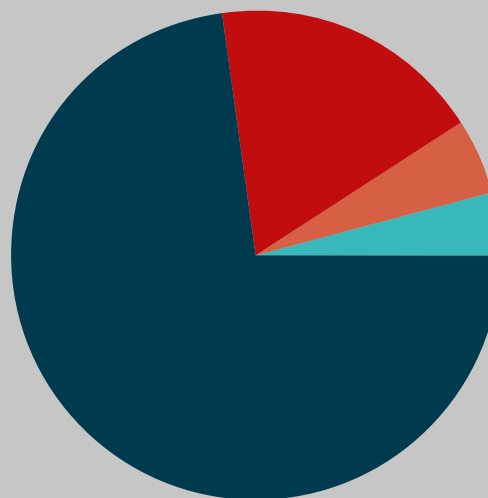

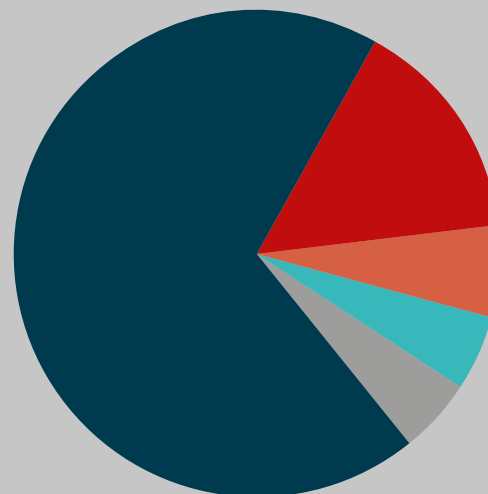
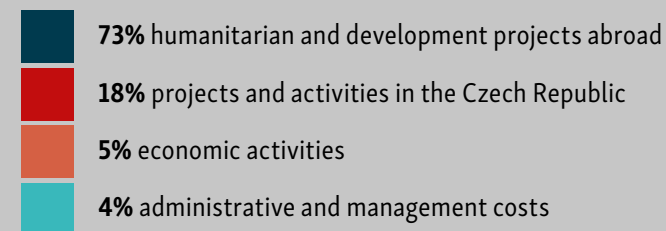

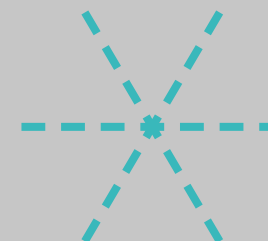
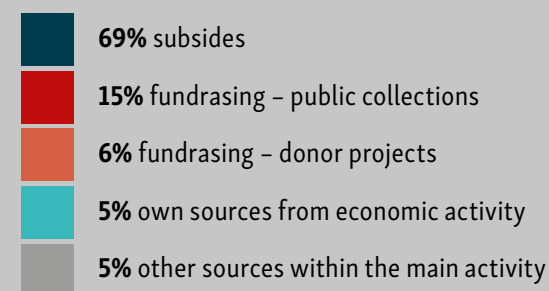

INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

To the Founder of Charita Česká republika

Opinion

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of Charita Česká republika (the Company) prepared in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the Czech Republic, which comprise the balance sheet as at 31 December 2025, and the income statement for the year then ended, and notes to the financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory information. For details of the Company, see Notes to the financial statements.

In our opinion, the accompanying financial statements give a true and fair view of the financial position of the Company as at 31 December 2025, and of its financial performance for the year then ended in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the Czech Republic.

Basis for Opinion

We conducted our audit in accordance with the Act on Auditors and Auditing Standards of the Chamber of Auditors of the Czech Republic, which are International Standards on Auditing (ISAs), as amended by the related application clauses. Our responsibilities under this law and regulation are further described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section of our report. We are independent of the Company in accordance with the Act on Auditors and the Code of Ethics adopted by the Chamber of Auditors of the Czech Republic and we have fulfilled our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with these requirements. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion.

In addition, we assess whether the other information has been prepared, in all material respects, in accordance with applicable law or regulation, in particular, whether the other information complies with law or regulation in terms of formal requirements and procedure for preparing the other information in the context of materiality, i.e. whether any non-compliance with these requirements could influence judgments made on the basis of the other information.

Based on the procedures performed, to the extent we are able to assess it, we report that:

- The other information describing the facts that are also presented in the financial statements is, in all material respects, consistent with the financial statements; and
- The other information is prepared in compliance with applicable law or regulation.

Based on the procedures we have performed on the other information obtained, we have not identified any material misstatement.

The Board of Directors is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the Czech Republic and for such internal control as the Board of Directors determines is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, the Board of Directors is responsible for assessing the Company's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to going concern and using the going

concern basis of accounting unless the Board of Directors either intends to liquidate the Company or to cease operations, or has no realistic alternative but to do so.

Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance, but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with above regulations will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of these financial statements.

As part of an audit in accordance with the above law or regulation, we exercise professional judgment and maintain professional skepticism throughout the audit. We also:

- Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error, design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks, and obtain audit evidence that is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control.

If we conclude that a material uncertainty exists, we are required to draw attention in our auditor's report to the related disclosures in the financial statements or, if such disclosures are inadequate, to modify our opinion. Our conclusions are based on the audit evidence obtained up to the date of our auditor's report. However, future events or conditions may cause the Company to cease to continue as a going concern.
- Evaluate the overall presentation, structure and content of the financial statements, including the disclosures, and whether the financial statements represent the underlying transactions and events in a manner that achieves fair presentation.

We communicate with the Board of Directors regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit and significant audit findings, including any significant deficiencies in internal control that we identify during our audit.

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I. General accounting principles

The organisation keeps accounts according to Act No. 593/1991 Coll. on Accounting, as amended, and Implementing Decree No. 504/2002 Coll., as amended (hereinafter referred to as "Accounting Regulations"). The values in this appendix are given in thousands of CZK (TCZK), unless otherwise stated.

I.1. Fixed assets

Tangible and intangible fixed assets are assets with a useful life of more than one year and a valuation amount of TCZK 80 or more.

Buildings, land and works of art are considered tangible fixed assets, regardless of their cost and useful life. Financial fixed assets are assets with a maturity of more than one year, regardless of valuation.

Fixed assets are valued at cost, i.e., including incidental acquisition costs, or at replacement cost (assets acquired free of charge).

Depreciation of tangible and intangible fixed assets is regulated by the depreciation plan, and the company applies the straight-line method of depreciation.

Non-current small tangible assets with a useful life of more than one year, valued at TCZK 5 - 80, are charged to costs and recorded in the operational records. Exceptions are laptops and computers, which are recorded from a value of TCZK 0.

I.2. Securities and shares

The organization records purchased securities as part of short-term financial assets, see section "II.2. Shares, participation certificates, bonds, stocks".

I.3. Inventories

The organization values inventories at cost including incidental acquisition costs. Donated inventories are valued according to the donation agreement.

I.4. Receivables

Receivables are valued at their nominal value when incurred. In accordance with the decree, an organization may create allowances for receivables in connection with activities which are subject to income tax. Any allowances are then made in accordance with Act No. 593/1992 Coll., on provisions for income tax purposes.

The organization accounts for estimated accounts receivable in the case of written promises of subsidies for activities that have already taken place (reflected in expenses) but will not be financially received until a later period.

The organisation accounts for the item "B.II.17. Other receivables" in accordance with the right to funds from foreign donors according to the accounting methodology specified in section I.8.3 Received subsidies.

I.5. Cash and securities

Cash and securities are valued at their nominal values. Separate bank accounts are set up for received funds from collections and selected tied donations (grants), on which these funds are recorded and reported.



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1.6. Foreign currency transactions

During the accounting period, the organization converts receivables and payables denominated in foreign currencies into Czech currency at the fixed monthly exchange rate announced by the CNB on the first day of each calendar month. Foreign exchange differences recognised at the end of the balance sheet date are presented, depending on their substance, in the profit and loss statement under "A.V.19 Exchange rate losses" or under "B.IV.8 Exchange rate gains". At the end of accounting period the value of funds, liabilities, receivables, subsidies and grants denominated in foreign currencies are converted into Czech currency at the CNB exchange rate as at 31 December.

Paid or received advances denominated in foreign currencies that have not been settled by the end of the financial year and are not expected to be repaid are recognised under "B.IV.1. Prepaid expenses" and "B.IV.2. Deferred revenues" in accordance with the National Accounting Council's Interpretation I-43 and I-47.

1.7. Accruals

The organisation accounts for deferred expenses. Through deferred expenses, it accrues expenses that are related to subsequent periods.

Deferred income is used mainly for the accrual of subsidies from the state budget, which is described in more details in section 1.8.3 Received subsidies.

1.8. Funds and equity

In accordance with accounting regulations, the funds are accounted for as follows:

- public collections, which were announced in accordance with Act No. 117/2001 Coll.,
- and resources received by the company from other persons and companies for the purpose of fulfilling the main mission of the company free of charge: subsidies, donations, tied donations (grants).

In the equity accounts, the company accounts for assets acquired from subsidies, grants, donated assets and materials. The balance also includes economic results up to 2003.

1.8.1 Public collection

Within the statement position Own resources in item "A.I.2. Funds", the organisation captures (an analytical distinction according to individual collections within the 911 accounts) resources obtained from public collections. On an ongoing basis, the organisation accounts for the use of the proceeds by double entry to the debit of the public collection fund to the credit of the item in the profit and loss statement "B.IV.9. Settlement of funds" in the case of material consideration for any service provided. In the case of the disposal of a public collection as a financial consideration to another party, the debit to the fund is recorded in the balance sheet against the debit of monetary funds. The reported balance of the public collection fund corresponds to the unused amount from the public collection intended for further use, i.e., the balance of the collection bank account as at the balance sheet date. Any differences between the balance of the collection bank account and the reported balance of the public collection fund are explained in point II. Additional data to the statements.



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1.8.2 Donation received

Received individual donations are accounted for by the organisation on the date of receipt to the credit of the item "A.I.2. Funds" and to the debit of asset items "B.III.1. Cash in hand" or "B.III.3. Cash at bank". The organisation accounts for the use of donations from the fund by double-entry to the debit of the fund and to the benefit of an item in the income statement "B.IV.9. Settlement of funds" (financial, non-financial). The reported balance of the individual donation fund corresponds to the amount of unused donations.

1.8.3 Received subsidies

Received subsidies are funds provided from public sources, i.e., mainly from the state budget, from the budgets of local governments, from the sources of state budgets of foreign states and other foreign providers. The organisation accounts for funds from public sources within the Czech Republic when taking a decision in the asset item "B.II.12. Grants receivable and other payments from the state budget" and in the profit and loss statement "B.II.1. Operational grants". In the case of a multi-annual subsidy, the amount corresponding to the unused subsidy in the given year is deferred by the liability account in item "B.IV.2. Deferred revenues". In the event of the grant funds are not exhausted, a liability is reported under liability item "B.III.12. Payables to state budget" in the amount of its unused part.

Funds from public sources from abroad are recorded by the organisation at the moment of their receipt to the credit of item "A.I.2. Funds" and to income under item "B.IV.9. Settlement of funds" are charged at the time the expenses are incurred. If the expenses incurred are higher than the money in the fund, the organisation accounts for a receivable from a foreign donor under item "B.II.17. Other receivables" up to the amount of the subsidy according to the decision on the given subsidy and its non-financed part.

1.8.4 Fixed assets acquired free of charge

In equity under "A.I.1. Equity", the organisation records the sources of the acquisition of fixed assets acquired free of charge intended for use for the main activities. This value is dissolved at the same time as the depreciation of these assets and is shown in the profit and loss statement in item "B.IV.10. Other revenues".

1.9. Income tax

The organisation is a public benefit taxpayer in accordance with Section 17a of Act No. 586/1992 Coll., on Income Taxes, as later amended (hereinafter referred to as the ITA). The organisation applies the exemption of gifts pursuant to Section 19b paragraph 2 b) of the ITA whenever possible.

In December, the organisation drew a loan in the amount of CZK 902 928 for the acquisition of kitchen equipment. The loan has a maturity of 36 months. Monthly installments amount are in the amount of CZK 29 329. The first installment was made in January 2026.

II.5. Off-balance sheet assets

In 2024, Caritas Czech Republic recorded off-balance sheet assets in the amount of TCZK 14 523, which were purchased and loaned to individual diocesan charities in response to emergency events (floods). These assets included dehumidifiers, dryers, generators, and vacuum cleaners. During 2025, these assets were contractually transferred to the respective diocesan charities. As of 31 December 2025, only assets from the operational inventory, amounting to TCZK 4 035, remain recorded off-balance sheet.

II.6. Off-balance sheet liabilities

In accordance with the agreement on the acceptance of a financial contribution from the donor, a bank guarantee was established in favor of the donor in 2024. This guarantee served as a security to ensure that the organization meets the conditions and objectives set out in the agreement. The bank guarantee was



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issued in the amount of
EUR 255 472 (TCZK 6 434) with a maturity date of 31 August 2025. In 2025 the bank guarantee was
cancelled in the full amount.

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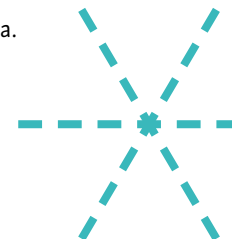
